
# Missions Committee

## Church Council News

The Council met for its regular monthly meeting on Monday February 10th. The meeting was called to order by Don Borgman. Devotion for the evening was presented by Blaine Beissenherz.

The agenda for the meeting was approved. This was the first meeting of the Council following the annual meeting, so the first order of business was to elect Council Officers for the coming year. Office positions were elected as follows: President - Don Borgman; Vice President-Brandon Niendick; Secretary - Blaine Beissenherz; and Treasurer - Amanda Travis. In addition, Council members were elected to serve as representatives on committees as follows: Randy Dowell – Endowment Committee; Brandon Niendick – Cemetery; Denise Kaullen – Preschool; Blaine Beissenherz-Building & Grounds.

Financial reports for the month of were approved as presented. The Council requested that going forward the investments (Certificates of Deposit) of the Church be listed on each monthly reports. Additionally, the Council requested that the Cemetery accounts and Cemetery investments also be provided to the Church Council each month in the same format as Church Accounts.

Minutes of the Church Council meeting of December 10th were approved as presented. In January the Church Council and the Spiritual Council met jointly to prepare for the Annual Meeting. Minutes of the Annual Meeting held on January 26th were also reviewed.

Under Old Business the Child Safety Policy was discussed and some suggestions were made that will simplify and clarify some sections of the policy. Amanda Travis will confer with congregation members involved with Children's Ministry and will make additional revisions to the Policy. The Council also reviewed suggestions made at the three informational meetings held to discuss Bylaws revisions as well as plans for the incorporation of the Church. At least one more informational meeting will be held prior to the March 30 Special Meeting where these matters will be presented to the Congregation for vote. Under New Business Randy Dowell presented the plans for new informational and directional signage for the Church campus. In addition to signage design, Randy also presented plans for signage locations and the Council approved the recommendations as presented.

Blaine Beissenherz, Chairman of the Pastor Search Committee gave a report on progress in the search process. Blaine reported that the Committee has looked at many resumes, has had preliminary conversations with several candidates, and currently is in discussions and is encouraged by one candidate in particular.

With no further business to consider, the meeting was adjourned.

# I Know That My Redeemer Lives

ONCE-A-DAY WALK WITH JESUS DEVOTIONAL

That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched—this we proclaim concerning the Word of life. 1 John 1:1

John's proclamation is a triumphant statement of faith.

Some Christians were stumbling over the Gnostic teaching that Jesus did not really have a body. This heresy borrowed much from contemporary philosophy but contradicted the gospel. Gnosticism had weakened the faith of some, so John wrote to remind the church of the truth of the incarnation. How like John's audience we are! The foolish philosophies of this world easily take us captive.

"Oh, brethren, could you and I pass this day through these heavens and see what is now going on in the sanctuary above—could you see what the child of God now sees who died last night—could you see the Lamb with the scars of his five deep wounds sitting in the very midst of the throne—could you see the thousands, all singing, 'Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain' (Revelation 5:12)—and were one of these angels to tell you, 'This is he that undertook the cause of lost sinners; there he is upon the throne of heaven; consider him; look long and earnestly upon his wounds and glory'—could you see all these things, do you think it would be safe to trust him?

" 'Yes, yes,' every soul exclaims. 'Lord, it is enough! Let me ever stand and gaze upon the almighty, allworthy, all-divine Savior! Yes, though the sins of all the world were on my wicked head, still I could not doubt that his work is complete, and that I am quite safe when I believe in him.' "

### WALK CLOSER TO GOD

John had enough faith to publicly proclaim his Christianity at a time when it brought imprisonment or death. Do you have enough faith to "salt" your conversation with Christ at a time when it might bring scorn?

If you're like most of us, you answered, "Well, maybe." Fortunately, we have a Savior who hears us when we cry, "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" (Mark 9:24). Be encouraged. That is a prayer he will answer.

### Who Was St. Patrick?

observing the Roman Catholic feast day of St. Patrick on March 17. The first St. Patrick's Day parade took place not in Ireland but in America. Records show that a St. Patrick's Day parade was held on March 17, 1601 in a Spanish colony in what is now St. Augustine, Florida. The parade, and a St. Patrick's Day celebration a year earlier were organized by the Spanish Colony's Irish

vicar Ricardo Artur. More than a century later, homesick Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched in New York City on March 17, 1772 to honor the Irish patron saint. Enthusiasm for the St. Patrick's Day parades in New York City, Boston and other early American cities only grew from there.
